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FARMINGTON HIGH SCHOOL CAPSTONE/ASPIRE PROGRAM RECEIVES STEM GRANT FROM TOSHIBA AMERICA FOUNDATION FOR \$6,439

Farmington, CT (8/8/23) – The Farmington Public Schools and Farmington High School are pleased to announce it has received a \$6,439 STEM grant from the Toshiba America Foundation (TAF). These funds will support the Capstone - Engineering, Development, and Design and the ASPIRE - Mechatronics courses.

With these funds, students enrolled in these courses will be able to develop a holonomic drive system using a real-time 3d cartesian coordinate system for precise field localization and navigation using April tags. This will facilitate autonomous routing and delivery options. The physical system will be developed using commercially available advanced hobbyist components. The software will make use of publicly available code libraries as a basis for customization. Object detection and collision avoidance using emerging AI technology is a stretch goal of this project.
